

Welcome Our New CEO

On Monday May 16th I walked into Chattanooga Community Kitchen for my first day of work. I was eager to meet the team, engage with the program participants, and begin to get assimilated with my new surroundings. I had accepted the job 5 weeks prior and had been busy transitioning out of my previous job, packing up my personal belongings, and planning the transition from southeast Pennsylvania to the scenic city of Chattanooga. As with any job, there are multiple factors that come into consideration, but I'd like to share with you the things that stood out to me about CCK that made it an easy decision.

The primary component was the philosophy that guides all we do at "the Kitchen." CCK holds to a philosophy that all of our efforts should be designed with the goal of moving people toward a path of self-sufficiency! To me that was a huge factor. Yes, the Kitchen provides numerous services that meet the immediate needs of the homeless such as food, showers, haircuts, foot care and a place to be inside during hot or cold weather. But that's just a part of the work we do. Our team actively works with individuals and families to help them navigate and overcome the barriers to self-sufficiency. From assisting with employment, to helping people navigate the housing process, the Kitchen actively works with hundreds of people a year to place them into safe and secure and sustainable living situations.

A second factor that came into play was the positive name recognition of the ministry in Chattanooga and the long history of partnering with a multitude of volunteers to provide our vast array of services. Since my first day I have been impressed by how many people serve as volunteers; some have been serving for decades! Without this army of volunteers and supporters, our ability to meet the enormous need of the homeless would not be possible.

The third factor that influenced my decision was the warmth and generous attitude of everyone I had encountered in this great city. Everyone I spoke with was aware of the significant number of homeless individuals and families and seemed willing and eager to band together and help provide help and solutions. And it's this last point that I want to make an appeal to you, friends of the Kitchen.

We have a huge task ahead of us. As we continue to add services and improve on what we do, the challenge is quite large in scope with nearly 4,000 individuals in our region needing assistance. My appeal to you is to take a few minutes and think of people who may not know about CCK. Forward this newsletter to them. Introduce me to them. Share our website link with them. I am confident that together we can solve this crisis, but it will take more people. It will require additional resources. I'd like to significantly grow the ranks of those who further our work, either through volunteering or through financial donations. Your assistance in this will go a long way! Will you help?

Let's continue the great tradition of generosity that I have found in Chattanooga!
